Early education is vital for a child's future achievement, yet low-income families often lack access to early learning opportunities.

The work of Madonna Center is aimed at transforming the future for these children through our focused model of early childhood education, social services, and a strong sense of community.

Through a strong partnership with Parent Child, Inc. (PCI) we offer an early Head Start program for children from age 2 months to 3 years. Our programs focus on developing activities well suited to each age group that encourages growth and development. In order for the families to qualify for services they must be working or in school. These are income-based program that works with Child Care Services (CCS) to help families pay for the tuition. We also offer a Preschool Program for children ages 3 to 5 years old.

In addition, we offer afterschool care and transportation from local public and charter schools for elementary aged children. Students are provided homework support, exercise play, healthy snacks and dinner daily.

During holiday breaks and the summer, we provide opportunities for continued learning to students that focus on STEM. Students also participate in peerbased learning on field trips to the DoSeum, San Antonio College Planetarium and the San Antonio Zoo which enhance their problem-solving skills.

This work could not be possible without the support of partners like the United Way of Bexar County, San Antonio Area Foundation, Kronkosky Charitable Foundation and Baptist Health Foundation.



#### GROWTH

As we have expanded childcare and program services, we have grown from **9 to 34 staff members.** 

Financially, we've increased the amount of awarded grants we've managed from \$187,136 in 2016 to \$958,688 in 2020.

In addition, the board has strived to create a reserve fund managed by the San Antonio Area Foundation to help us better prepare for the future of the organization.

## **SOCIAL SERVICES**

Over the last 5 years, we've expanded program services to meet the growing needs of our families and seniors.

In 2016, we were awarded a grant through the United Way of Bexar County to begin the HIPPY Program. HIPPY is an evidence-based family support model that works directly with parents in their homes to give them resources and to develop their skills to become their child's first teacher. Home educators visited families in person and virtually to ensure children were learning and ultimately ready for school.

Our seniors program offered a safe community space to learn, create and socialize. Through the generous support of the Well-Med Charitable Foundation. San Antonio Area Foundation. Bexar Alamo County, Area Council Governments (AACOG), and San Antonio Bank we provided improved support services for over 70 seniors and expanded services from three to five days a week. This included field trips, health screenings, arts and crafts and hot meals for seniors. In addition, our partnership with UT Health Science Center School of Nursing has provided wellness checks and health education to ensure seniors age in place well.

In partnership with the Bexar County Health Collaborative, we've worked to address health inequities and improve the overall health of our community through the Grow Healthy Together Pathways Community HUB Program. Our team of community health workers have served as a life line for families, providing referrals (or pathways) so they can receive the support they need.

Additional services including nutrition/food, housing, wellness, substance abuse and domestic violence resources are also provided. To date, there have been over 9,000 referrals made to services in the community.

As the needs in our community change, we will continue to work with families to ensure they have what they need to not just survive, but to thrive.
